

Vital Signs Southern Highlands Key Findings







Most dissatisfied aspect of living here; condition of roads, lack of transport options and rental affordability



Around 600 properties in any week on short-term rental market impacting longterm rental stock



5 year trend increase in crime associated with sexual assaults, domestic violence and breach of AVO. Many other crimes are trending down.

Domestic violence related assaults increased over 5 years as have breaches of AVO's














HOME OWNERSHIP



77% of households were purchasing or fully owned their home, 19.3% were renting, 2.3% were in social housing

44.6% owned their dwelling as compared to 31.5% in NSW. 32.5% were purchasing as compared to 32.5% in NSW. 19.3% were renting compared to 32.6% in NSW

DWELLINGS



90.1% of total dwellings were separate houses compared to 80.6% in regional NSW. 8.9% of dwellings were medium or high density compared to 17% in regional NSW



Dwellings increased 1,951 between 2016 and 2021 of these 1,730 were separate houses and 320 were medium density

BUILDING APPROVALS



In 2021-22 there were 438 new residential approvals of which 337 were houses. This compares to an average annual residential approval level of 402 since 2016

DWELLING SIZE



Dwellings with 4 or more bedrooms were most common at 47.9% and grew the most since 2016. 11.7% were dwellings with 2 bedrooms. 36% were dwellings with 3 bedrooms

VEHICLES



62% of households had access to 2 or more cars and 23.5% had access to 3 or more vehicles. 33.4% had one vehicle and 3.3% had no motor vehicles

TOURISM



Total tourism sales are \$229.2M and contribute a further value add to the community of \$142.7M



There are 1,357,074 domestic visitor nights up 12% from 1,197,777 in 2015/16

In the last 5 years there was an average of 9,669 international visitors per year with an average length of stay of 15.1 days



55.8% of international visitors were visiting friends and relatives - more than double the NSW state where 25.5% were visiting friends and relatives

GIVING



Volunteering rate, gift/donation rate and median gift size (The Seer Giving Index) for a region has Bowral in the 97th percentile. Hill Top - Colo Vale is in the 45th percentile



Taxpayer reported gifts or donations 28.8% compared to 27.3% in NSW. Bowral highest at 35.1%
